RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION To LEGALIZING SLOT MACHINES IN MARYLAND

We, the members of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship at Easton, are strongly opposed to legalizing slot machines (video lottery terminals) at various locations in Maryland wherever they may be. We believe it is morally wrong for our state government to sanction gambling as a regressive means of raising revenues whether for schools or other public purposes. The history of slot machine gambling in Maryland and other states has shown that it benefits the few at the expense of some of its poorest citizens and brings with it such social pathologies as domestic violence, child neglect, damaging addiction, mortgage defaults, drug and alcohol-related crime, organized crime, prostitution, and corruption. We strongly feel that our state government has no business promoting this harmful activity. Accordingly, we urge all Maryland voters to vote "No" on the proposed referendum that would amend Maryland's constitution to enshrine provisions that would legalize slots and determine where they would be located.

A few Words from Religious Education

Our elementary group will complete Unit 4: Partners with Nature in the first two weeks of May. These sessions will help children gain a greater awareness of their interdependence with nature and of their capacity for taking care of nature. Look for this group on the nature trail! The children will complete Unit 5: Unitarian Universalists Working for a Fair and Peaceful World the last two weeks of May. This unit introduces the children to a variety of UUs who are working to make the world a more peaceful and fair place.

Our upper elementary/middle school group will complete Unit 3: "Peace and Justice with Others" the first two weeks in May. The last two weeks in May we begin our last unit for this year, Unit 4: Peace and Justice with our Earth. This unit focuses on the concept of earth as a precious, interconnected, and interdependent whole system. We will discuss the Gai hypothesis which assumes that a balance must endure if the system is to survive. More than 150 years ago, Chief Seattle expressed his vision: "The earth does not belong to the people; people belong to the earth. All things are connected like the blood which unites one family. People did not weave the web of life; we are merely one strand in it. Whatever we do to the web, we do to ourselves."

The elementary group needs 2 or 3 adult members of UUFEE to join their class during Unit 5 studies to talk about working for a fair and peaceful world. If you are interested please see Diane Bell or Colleen Ronning for the exact date.

A special thanks to those in the Fellowship who were "Mystery Friends". The children really enjoyed it and we hope you did too!

Formal Church School classes end on **June 15** with a celebration! From June 22 through August 17 the RE Committee will be looking for volunteers from the congregation to work with our children. Because summer enrollment is usually lower, we will have just one classroom. Volunteers will be responsible for creating a stand-alone activity that helps the children learn something new. For example, outdoor cooperative/team building games, board games, nature walks, painting, drawing, clay sculpting, acting (plays), puppet shows, homemade bird feeders, etc. There will be sign-up on the RE bulleting board beginning May 4th. We still have \$36,000 to pay on our line of credit loan at Talbot Bank. This amount is the outstanding balance on our Extended Capital Campaign. We thank those members who have generously overpaid their pledged amount. However, we definitely need payment of all remaining pledges by April 2009. The sooner this loan is paid, the less interest we will pay the bank.

Social Action

The Social Action committee approved a \$100 contribution to the Mid-Shore Fresh Start program which works to establish transitional housing and services for people who are recovering from substance abuse.

Social Action is US

... or should I say UU? As the Social Action Committee pours over responses from its recent survey, one thing is clear: Social Action has been on the minds -- and, in many cases, the schedules -- of our members. From peace vigils to housing, animal rights to global warming, local schools to mediation, the concerns and activities of our members span an ever widening range of issues.

Top on the list of activities that members have supported in the past is fair housing. More than one third of the results tallied so far indicate participation in Habitat for Humanity projects. Four have worked on other housing projects such as winterization and Rebuilding Together.

Nearly a third of the members have participated in Wednesday lunches for the needy or other food projects such as Food Link/Food Bank. Six individuals (of the 44 responses) participated in peace vigils and marches. Six have been active in PFLAG, Equality Maryland or both. Five have worked on voting, elections or open government campaigns. Four have participated in lobbying and/or efforts to educate the public on the issue of climate action (global warming).

Numerous other involvements in social action were mentioned on the surveys and will be included in a final report after all survey forms have been returned and tallied.

Survey respondents mentioned dozens of social concerns and made more than a dozen suggestions regarding how Uufe and the Social Action Committee might focus its efforts in the future. These will be considered as the group wraps up this fiscal year's activities and looks forward to next year's projects and contributions.

Unitarian Universalist Fellowship at Easton Children's Safety Policies and Procedures

Purpose: To ensure a safe environment for children who participate in UUFE programs.

Policies: Teachers, parents/guardians, children, youth, and/or staff will receive instruction in appropriate behaviors and covenant to adhere to those behaviors.

Procedures:

- 1) Teachers, advisors, mentors, and others who work with children and youth will sign an annual Code of Ethics and receive training in the following areas:
 - a. Releasing children: Release children only to a parent/guardian or parent designee.
 - b. Handling Injuries: Report injuries promptly to Religious Education staff and /or parent. Ask parents/guardians to treat wounds whenever possible. Otherwise use protective gloves and wash hands thoroughly immediately afterwards. Ask parents to change diapers whenever possible.
 - c. Emergency evacuation procedures: Meet in designated area.
 - d. Avoid being alone with a child. There should always be an open door or a window in the door when a teacher and child are alone. RE staff monitors all classrooms and nursery during RE classes. At other times there should be at least two adults present when children are present. A ratio of one adult to 5 children is recommended, with a minimum of two adults.
- 2) Parents/guardians are required to register their children and to sign a liability release form each year or for special events including trips off the premises.
 - a. Parents/guardians of young children are instructed to pick up their child promptly after class or to inform a teacher if another adult will be doing so.
- 3) Children are instructed to neither play nor loiter in the parking area, and to always keep an adult or the Fellowship building in sight. Unmonitored trips on the nature trail are not permitted.
- 4) All children and youth participating in Fellowship activities will be instructed to refrain from: drug use, violent actions, sexual activity, and other inappropriate behaviors while on the premises.
- 5) RE staff will review safety policies and procedures with all volunteers working with children.
- 6) RE staff should be trained in the following areas:
 - a. Child abuse awareness
 - b. First aid, CPR, and Universal Precautions
- 7) UUFE will maintain adequate liability insurance to cover accidental injuries.

Debbie has been practicing Yoga for ten years and teaching for the last five years. She has taught at Evergreen Cove and at Salisbury University.

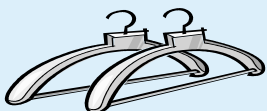

A LETTER FROM BACH TO THE FUTURE Concert Date Sunday, May 4

Bach to the Future, in conjunction with the Delaware Choral Society, is presenting a concert we feel will be of interest and relevance to our community of faith. The title of the concert is "Songs of Hope and Struggle," an inspiring program celebrating the human spirit through works that show the importance of music and literature in the midst of human struggles. The concert will feature *The Holocaust Cantata—Songs from the Camps* by Donald McCullough, performed to recognize International Holocaust Remembrance Day. *The Holocaust Cantata* uses the words and music of concentration camp inmates to create an original and powerful work. Using material found within the archives of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, the work depicts one of the bleakest episodes in human history, yet evokes a sense of music's life-affirming power. Even in the face of absolute despair, music expresses what words alone cannot.

The program will present the Maryland and Delaware premier of "The 21st Century (A Girl Born in Afghanistan)" by Gregory Bartholomew. It is a setting of text from the Nobel Lecture by Peace Prize Laureate Kofi Annan which teaches "In this new century, we must start from understanding that peace must be made real and tangible in the daily lives of every man and woman," and compels us to remember that "we can love what we are without hating what we are not, without hating who we are not."

The program also includes songs arising from Black America's struggle for freedom and equality, from the days of slavery to the civil rights movement in the 1960's. Selections include "*Lift Every Voice*," a hymn composed a century ago by two African-American brothers, James Weldon and J. Rosamond Johnson. Written in the days of the Jim Crow South, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" inspired African Americans to persist in their struggle for equal rights and became known as the "Black National Anthem." Other selections on the program are "*Hymn to Freedom*," a composition with deep musical meaning and cultural importance, composed by Oscar Peterson, inspired by Martin Luther King, and "*Spirit Suite*," a trio of well known and loved spirituals arranged by contemporary composer Mark Hayes.

The concert date is May 4, 2008 at 2:30 p.m. at the Historic Avalon Theater, Easton. Tickets are \$12 in advance or \$15 at the door and will be sold at Crackerjacks in Easton and St. Michaels Candy Store in St. Michaels. There is no charge for children and students with ID.

Bach to the Future is funded in part by the Maryland States Arts Council and the Talbot County Arts Council, who receive funding by grants from the MSAC, which is dedicated to cultivating a vibrant cultural community where the arts thrive. An agency of the Department of Business & Economic Development, MSAC provides financial support and technical assistance for arts activities to non-profit organizations, units of government, and schools.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO UUFEBYLAWS

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1 (No Change)

Membership requirements: The Fellowship welcomes into membership all persons who are in agreement with its purposes, regardless of race, color, religious background, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, political persuasion, marital status, or disability.

Section 2

Membership classifications:

Old Wording Section 2(a):

a.) Active Members. Any person 18 years of age or older who is in agreement with the Fellowship's Statement of Purpose may become an active member by entering his/her name in the Register of Membership. Active members are expected to participate in, and make a financial contribution of record to, the Fellowship. Only active members will be counted toward certification of membership to the UUA.

Proposed Wording Section 2(a):

a.) Adult Members: Any person 18 years of age or older who is in agreement with the Fellowship's Statement of Purpose can become a member by entering his/her name in the Register of Membership. Adult members are expected to participate and to make an annual financial pledge to the Fellowship.

Rationale for Section 2(a) Change:

It is desirable for members to make a pledge in order to facilitate good financial planning for each fiscal year. "Financial contribution of record" was deleted because of the confusion surrounding that term. A pledge is very specific and easy to determine. A minimum pledge is not specified.

Old Wording Section 2(b):

b.) Inactive Members: A member may be placed on the inactive list either by request or by decision of the Board of Trustees, in the absence of participation in and recorded financial support of the Fellowship over a one-year period. Inactive members shall have no vote and no rights within the UUA, nor will they be counted on any formal list of membership. Inactive members may be removed from the inactive list by decision of the Board of Trustees.

Proposed Change Section 2(b):

Eliminate this paragraph.

Rationale for Section 2(b) Change:

The Member Services Committee cannot identify a good reason to have this category. We believe that once a person is no longer a member they can become a friend of the Fellowship and we do not need an Inactive Member category.

Old Wording Section 2(c):

c.) Youth Members: Any person age 14 through 17 years who fulfills requirements set by the Religious Education Committee, may become a Youth Member with full voting rights. By signing the Youth Membership Book, they will be expected to participate in, and make a financial contribution of record, to the Fellowship.

Section 2(c) Renumbered to Section 2(b)

Proposed Wording Section 2(b):

b.) Youth Members: Any person age 14 through 17 years who fulfills the requirements set by the Religious Education Committee, can become a Youth Member with full voting rights by entering his/her name in the Youth Membership Book. Youth members are expected to participate and to make an annual financial pledge to the Fellowship.

Rationale for Section 2(b) Change:

To be consistent with the wording for adult members

Section 3 (No Change)

A review of the membership rolls shall be made by the Board of Trustees each year. Written notification of any change of status will be given to the individual.
