Ministerial Thoughts

Daniel's Docket:

Woody Allen remarked that, “Eighty percent of success is showing up.” For the next twelve months I will be showing up at worship services, committee meetings, and other Fellowship functions having recently (August 16th) agreed to be the interim minister at UUFE. We will see if my showing up leads to any successes.

During Barbara’s and Jim’s ministries I kept a low profile and therefore have not had the opportunity to get acquainted with many in the Fellowship. Here is a brief bio: I am a native of Talbot County, born in Easton Hospital (02/27/27) the son of a ferry boat captain, Daniel G. Higgins, Sr. and a public school teacher, Anna D. Higgins. Graduating from St. Michaels High School on D-Day (6 June 1944) I enlisted in the army and served in the Southwest Pacific Theatre with occupation duty in Japan. Upon discharge I enrolled in the University of Maryland in February of 1947. Upon graduation (BA in Political Science) I attended Temple University and married Jean after graduating (S.T.M in Reformation Studies) in September 1954, a marriage blessed by Kim, Cynthia, Daniel, and Ann.

After a second tour in the military during the Korean conflict, as an Army Chaplain, I was the minister of Christ United Methodist Churches in Salisbury from 1961 to 1965.

In 1965 I was accepted in the UU ministry and served churches in Massachusetts and Texas. While in Massachusetts I served on the UUA Board of Trustees and as chair of the UUA General Assembly Planning Committee. In 1977, at the age of fifty, I received a doctorate in Social Ethics from Meadville/Lombard Theological School, affiliated with the University of Chicago.

In 1987 I returned to my boyhood home in Claiborne for retirement. Somehow, a funny thing happened on the way to retirement. From 1987 to 1997 I was the part-time minister at UUFE and filled in at Chestertown and Salisbury.

Once again I am the only UU minister on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. This is probably more than you want to know.

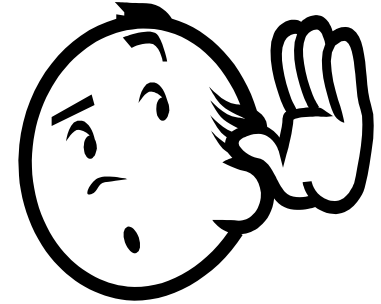

Building Notes



An acoustical analysis of the Meeting Room has been completed by Neil Thompson Shade of Acoustical Design Collaborative, Ltd. Neil constructed a computer model of the Meeting Room, finishes and furnishings, then made an acoustical calculation to determine existing conditions. Neil summarized these as: ".....moderately reverberant especially at high frequencies and have undesirable sound reflections. Problems exist with flutter echoes from the side walls and long-delayed sound reflections from the rear wall."

Neil recommends that we install a band of one inch thick cloth-covered fiberglass panels along the side and rear walls of the Meeting Room. The Board reviewed his detailed recommendation and decided to make the installation in two phases.

Phase 1 will entail installing 3 foot high fiberglass panels near the top of the side and rear walls of the back portion of the Meeting Room. There is a real possibility that this treatment may be enough to considerably improve our room acoustics. After this installation is completed and the room conditions are re-evaluated, consideration will be given to installing additional panels on the side walls of the main section of the Meeting Room.

We wish to avoid the Phase 2 installation if possible due to the possible impact on the looks of the room. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact Dick Doughty.



Starting Off Our Religious Education Year

For those of you I have not met officially let me introduce myself. My name is Liz Hausburg and I am the Coordinator of Religious Education, currently a teacher specialist at Sudlersville Middle School, and have spent the last 22 years working for Queen Anne's County Public School System as a teacher and teacher specialist. I have worked with other religious education programs as a Sunday School teacher in addition to being an administrator.

UUFE Policies & Procedures on Dedicated Contributions

The Fellowship encourages participation by all members in the selection of programs and projects to be funded. The annual budget process insures that all staff and committees have input into the proposed budget. The draft budget is reviewed and approved by the Board, then presented for final approval at the Annual Meeting where individual members may suggest modifications. This insures that all needs are considered. Contributions, without restrictions on their use, are encouraged to support the Fellowship budget as well as capital projects.

The Fellowship's policy on "dedicated contributions" is governed by the basic principle that each member in a democratic polity has an equal voice in the decisions on which programs and projects are to be funded regardless of that person's financial contribution to the Fellowship either through a regular pledge or by a "dedicated contribution." Accordingly, such "dedicated contributions" should not ordinarily be accepted as they tend to give the donor more influence on Fellowship programs than other donors who may not be able to make such financial contributions.

When a person proposes that a contribution be reserved for a specific project or purpose, the contributor shall be informed of the Fellowship policy in the paragraph above and encouraged to place their contribution in an established fund without restriction as to its use.

If the contributor wishes to seek exception to the policy, the proposal shall be referred to the responsible program committee(s) for review and then forwarded to the Board for approval. The proposal shall concurrently be referred to the Finance Committee for a review of its budget and financial implications. Upon receipt of the recommendation of the program and finance committees, the Board may reject or approve the proposal, and submit it to the membership for approval if deemed necessary.

Credit for dedicated gifts shall not be given to fulfill a pledge.

Our Campaign

Thanks to everyone who so generously contributed to our Capital Campaigns. A status report on the Extended Capital Campaign follows:

The construction contract with Harrington Construction Co. has been completed and a 30-year mortgage for \$240,000 at 7.5 % interest was signed with Talbot Bank on July 24th. The Capital Fund will be considered closed to new expenditures, other than the planned furnishings and acoustical panels. We have a balance due on our remaining line of credit of \$137,629, and would like to satisfy this loan as soon as possible to reduce the amount of interest paid to the bank. If you are able, please consider completing your pledge to the Extended Capital Campaign at this time.

The total amount pledged for our Extended Capital Campaign was \$241,883 and to date we have received \$110,236; \$131,647 remains to be paid by April 2009. \$6,000 is currently in our Capital checking account.

There is also an additional \$45,000 member loan to satisfy.

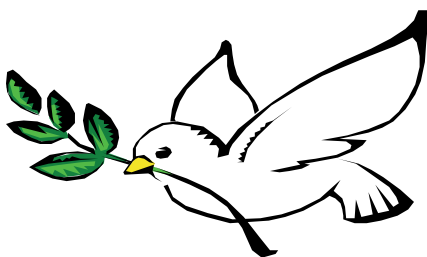
Peace One Day
